Dr. Robert received his BS in Applied Biology from Georgia Institute of Technology and his DDS from Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. During his undergraduate and dental training he conducted research in bio-engineering, and then while in the U.S. Army conducted bone graft research at the

Letterman Army Institute of Research. He completed his oral and maxillofacial surgery residency at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. He is currently in private practice and is Clinical Professor in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco in the OMFS residency program. He directs the Office Anesthesia curriculum and co-directs the curricula in Major Surgical Anatomy and Dentoalveolar Surgery. He teaches courses for post graduate students from several specialties in anesthesia, emergency preparedness, orthognathic surgery, dentoalveolar surgery, anatomy and physiology, embryology and clinical photography. He is recipient of the Outstanding Educator of the Year Award and the Distinguished Colleague Award at the School of Dentistry at UCSF. Dr. Robert has been active in hospital affairs and chaired the sections of Oral Surgery and Dentistry at Mt. Zion Hospital in San Francisco and Seton Medical Center in Daly City, California. He also chaired the Task Force which created the AAOMS guide on Office Anesthesia Delivery and has authored chapters on anesthesia and pharmacology in current textbooks and articles in oral and maxillofacial surgery journals.

PRESENTATION

Office-based anesthesia for the extremes of age presents formidable challenges. This presentation will address anatomic and physiologic issues which impact our anesthetics, preoperative workup, premedication, the type of anesthetics we choose, medication dosing, as well as perioperative and postoperative management. Review of closed claims will emphasize critical aspects of our patients' management.

PRESENTATION OUTLINE

- The joys and pitfalls of pediatric anesthesia – patient selection, preoperative workup, airway management, anesthetic dosing, and dealing with parents.
- Modification of your intravenous anesthetic for the geriatric patient – physiologic changes as our patients age dictate the agents utilized, dosing and perioperative management.
- Although they can present significant anesthetic hazards, gastrointestinal issues are frequently given little attention in discussions of perioperative management. We will address eating disorders, postoperative nausea and vomiting, GERD, and anesthesia for patients who have undergone bariatric surgery.
- The topics above will be augmented by a discussion of helpful anesthetic hints to assure more effective and safer anesthesia for our patients.
- Governmental oversight – a high-profile pediatric anesthetic death in California fueled a national discussion on anesthetic safety in dentistry and ushered in a new era of governmental oversight in California. We'll review what happened and what CALAOMS is doing about it.
